This ultimately led to the merge of her work with the Humane Society creating Doris Day Animal Foundation, a grant-giving non-profit that funds other organizations which share its mission of helping animals and the people who love them.



Doris Day owned the Cypress Inn, an elegant small boutique hotel in Carmel, California for twenty years. She was an entrepreneur in advocation for premium care to guests with four legs. Doris's deep devotion to anmimals helped put Cypress Inn on the map as the "Pet Friendliest" inn, in the "pet friendliest" town in America. Carmel is a place where dogs can run free on the beautiful beach and the community is very supportive of all its furry guests, providing them with treats and and countless hugs.
