Reveille, a rough collie, is the official mascot of Texas A&M. She is the highest-ranking officer in the corps and also carries the title, "First Lady of Aggieland".



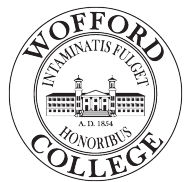
University of Georgia's mascot is an English bulldog, appropriately named Uga. *USA Today* named him the best dog in college football.
